



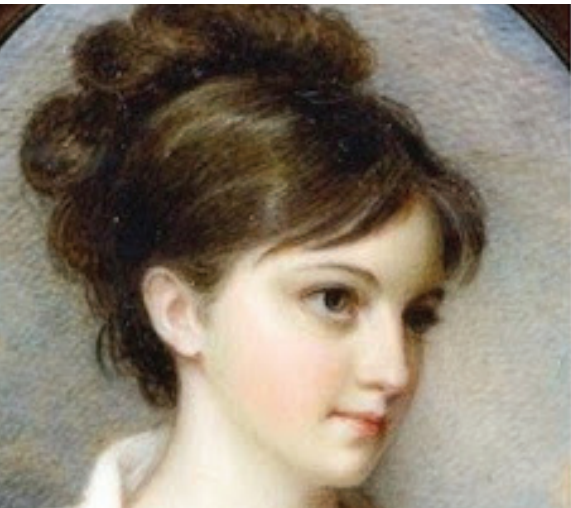


THE ABIGAIL ADAMS

Award

Awarded for holding decision-makers accountable or working to replace them. Abigail is famous for her letters on public policy. She advocated for education, women's rights and abolition despite never receiving a formal education herself.

Like Abigail, this award goes to someone who works on establishing good public policy by holding decision-makers accountable and building relationships that enable the work of liberty to move forward.



THE SYBIL LUDINGTON

Award

Awarded for raising awareness and understanding the limited role of government. At 16-years-old Sybil rode for forty miles to gather the militia against the British march into Danbury, New York; earning her the name "the female Paul Revere."

Like Sybil, this award goes to someone who tirelessly works to raise awareness. Today, the fight is the growing threat to parental rights by local and state government bodies. This award goes to the person that prioritizes exposing ideologies being taught in America's classrooms that are harmful to children.

THE PENELOPE BARKER

Award

Awarded for standing against overreach and intimidation tactics.

Penelope organized more than fifty women to boycott British tea in response to the 1773 Tea Act. Her efforts are the first known women's political demonstration in our country.

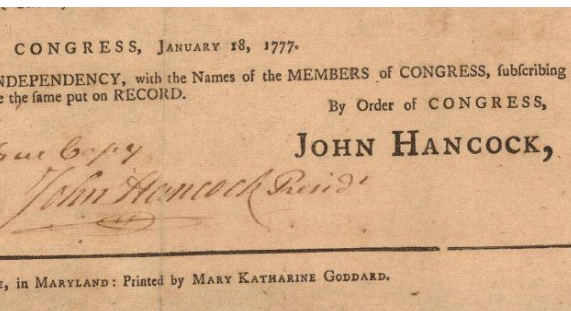
Like Penelope, this award goes to someone who refuses to cower to intimidating odds and stands against government overreach by organizing others to unify their voices for a larger impact, whether at the local or state level.





THE MARY KATHARINE GODDARD

Award



Awarded for promoting the principles of liberty in their home and community. Mary Katharine was the first person to publish the Declaration of Independence with all the signers' names. She included her name at the bottom as the publisher, framing her as a traitor alongside the signers. Like Mary Katherine, this award goes to someone who holds the principles of liberty so dear they are willing to promote it at all personal costs including losing careers, friendships and family.

THE DEBORAH SAMPSON

Award

Awarded for taking courageous action involving our communities and elected leaders to bring key issues impacting families to the forefront. Deborah was so invested in patriotism and the belief of liberty that she disguised herself as a man and fought in the Revolutionary War. Like Deborah, this award goes to someone who exhausts all options to engage in the fight for our children's future. This awardee demonstrates courage against adversity and finds creative and innovative ways to stand for liberty.



THE MERCY OTIS WARREN

Award

Awarded for influencing and shaping the narrative using modern tools of communication. Mercy was a poet, propagandist and the first American woman to write for a public audience. She documented revolutionary history and inspired early Americans with the written word, the social tools of her time. Like Mercy, this award goes to someone who influences others through modern tools of communication such as social media, podcasts, tv and radio to take action in the fight for liberty.



THE JOYFUL WARRIOR *Award*

Awarded for courageously embodying all aspects of our mission while maintaining a positive attitude and dignity under pressure. While all *Founders Awards* honor nominees' efforts in our fight for liberty, this award recognizes someone for the spirit they embody in that fight. Whereas others may allow frustration and injustice to stir them up to anger, a *Joyful Warrior* rejects those inclinations and chooses to inspire others through positivity. Like any warrior, they may suffer at times from fatigue, but they do not allow it to deter them.

Joyful Warriors exhibit grace under pressure, extend forgiveness, welcome all those willing to fight for parental rights and maintain focus on the mission at hand. This prestigious award goes to someone who embodies the emphasis Moms for Liberty places on building relationships, learning to work with those we may not always agree with and setting an example our children can be proud of.
